“Chinas: Democratization and the Rule of Law”

Speaker: Suisheng Zhao, Executive Director of the Center for China-US Cooperation Professor at the Graduate School of International Studies, University of Denver



Suisheng (Sam) Zhao is Executive Director of the Center for China-US Cooperation and a Professor at the Graduate School of International Studies, University of Denver. He is on the Board of Directors of US Committee of the Council for Security Cooperation in the Asia Pacific (USCSCAP), founder and editor of the *Journal of Contemporary China*, a member of National Committee on US-China Relations, and a Research Associate at the Fairbank Center for East Asian Research in Harvard University. A recipient of the 1999-2000 Campbell National Fellowship at Hoover Institution of Stanford University, he was Associate Professor of Political Science/International Studies at Washington College in Maryland, Associate Professor of Government/East Asian Politics at Colby College in Maine and visiting assistant professor in Graduate School of International Relations and Pacific Studies, University of California-San Diego. He received a PhD degree in Political Science from the University of California-San Diego (1992), a M.A. degree in Sociology from the University of Missouri and a M.A. degree in Economics from Peking University. He is the author and editor of six books.

His most recent books are *Across the Taiwan Strait: Mainland China, Taiwan, and the Crisis of 1995-96* (1999), *China and Democracy: Reconsidering the Prospects for a Democratic China* (2000), *Chinese Foreign Policy: Pragmatism and Strategic Behavior* (2003). His articles have appeared in *Political Science Quarterly*, *The China Quarterly*, *World Affairs*, *Asian Survey*, *Journal of Northeast Asian Studies*, *Asian Affairs*, *Journal of Democracy*, *Pacific Affairs*, *Communism* and *Post-Communism Studies*, *Problems of Post-Communism*, *The Journal of East Asian Affairs*, *Issues and Studies*, *Journal of Contemporary China*, and elsewhere. His new book, *A Nation-State by Construction: Dynamics of Modern Chinese Nationalism*, was published by Stanford University Press in 2004.
