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Xenia Dormandy is the Director of the Belfer Center's project on “India and the Subcontinent” and a member of the Board. Prior to this she was the Executive Director for Research at the Belfer Center. Until August, 2005 Ms Dormandy served as Director for South Asia at the National Security Council (NSC) where she played a key role in coordinating the July, 2005 visit of Indian Prime Minister Manmohan Singh that led to the new U.S.-India Strategic Relationship. Prior to her NSC post, Ms Dormandy served as a Foreign Affairs Specialist in the Bureau of South Asia at the Department of State. Her major portfolios included counter-terrorism, nonproliferation, Kashmir, and other law enforcement topics. During her tenure at the Department of State, Ms Dormandy was also a Special Advisor at the Homeland Security Group, and an officer in the Bureau of Nonproliferation. Shortly after September 11, 2001, Ms Dormandy was detailed from the Department of State to the Office of the Vice President (OVP) to help launch the Office of Homeland Security Affairs.

Ms Dormandy's articles and op-eds on international security and intrastate conflict issues have been published in a number of publications including *The Washington Quarterly*, *The Washington Post*, *Boston Globe*, and *International Herald Tribune*, and she has been interviewed on radio and television for such programs as the BBC World TV, NPR, Fox News, and Al Jazeera.

Prior to her government service Ms Dormandy worked in the nonprofit and private sectors in California, Israel, the West Bank, the U.K. and UNICEF in New York. She is a graduate of the Kennedy School of Government where she completed her Masters in Public Policy. She earned her Bachelor of Arts degree from Oxford University.
